Course Objectives:*

The following learning objectives are associated with this course:

- 1) Students will demonstrate a broad knowledge of the basic theoretical perspectives that guide psychological inquiry.
- 2) Students will be able to apply psychological principles to personal and social issues and problems.
- 3) Students will demonstrate an understanding of the basic research methods used in psychology, including classical and current experiments.

Course Requirements:*

Chapter Responses: For each chapter, you will be asked to answer one or more thought provoking questions that are designed to capture your understanding of the chapter and assimilate the material you should have read. The material covered in these questions is typically not directly covered in class and is designed to encourage you to read and use your text. Responses should only require between one to two paragraphs to answer. Students are allowed to reference their books in compiling their responses. Each response is worth 5 points and the lowest two scores will be dropped.

Examinations: There will be four exams associated with this course. Each exam will cover four chapters from the book and will be worth 100 points. Exams will not be comprehensive and the last exam will take the place of a formal final. With the exception of the last exam, exams will be in the testing center for approximately 5-6 days. The testing center automatically sets the late schedule and associated fee (please reference schedule for specific details on late day start times). The final exam will be in our assigned classroom (3106 JKB) on December 19th starting at 5:45 pm. You are responsible to insure you have time to take each exam when it is scheduled. If you are aware of a conflict regarding an exam then arrangements must be made in advance to prevent any loss of credit. Accommodations will only be given for exceptional circumstances.

* Note the Instructor reserves the right to change the syllabus and/or course schedule at anytime according to the perceived needs of the class. Should a change occur, each student will be notified.

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Research Participation: Department policy requires all students enrolled in Psych 111 are required to complete at least one hour of participation in various research being conducted on campus. To assist you in meeting this requirement, visit the psychology webpage at: <https://psychology.byu.edu/Pages/SONA-Systems.aspx> and then click on Sign Up as a Participant. While you have until the end of the semester to complete this assignment it is STRONGLY recommended that you act on this early in the semester. There is often only a limited amount of opportunities available and these tend to fill up fast. Furthermore, these opportunities are typically only 10-20 minutes in length, therefore requiring that you complete 2-3 to get your hour fulfilled. The early bird truly gets the proverbial worm. Note that if your actual time for a project is less than what you were scheduled for, you will get credit for the full time. That is, if you sign up for a project that is estimated to take 30 minutes but complete the task in 10 minutes, you will receive 30 minutes of research participation credit.

Learning Groups: Each student will be assigned to a learning group consisting of 4-5 students. The purpose of these learning groups is to, 1) provide students a steady and familiar group to engage in learning activities and out-of-class studying, and 2) complete specific course assignments. The latter is detailed below:

Active Learning Assignments: There will be approximately 12 active learning assignments, each worth 10 points. These assignments are designed to help enhance learning of course material. Some of these will be completed solely during class while others will require some preparation prior to class. Specific details of each assignment will be posted on Learning Suites or detailed in class.

Psychology Lab: Each group will engage in a more in depth psychological learning exercise. Groups will pick a topic from the course (i.e., emotion, learning, memory, intelligence, personality, developmental, social psychology, etc.) and then develop an experiment or study. As part of this exercise each group will develop a hypothesis or question about their topic that they wish to explore and then develop a methodology to explore that question. Each group will submit a proposal for approval. After approval, the group will then attempt to collect data on their topic. Each group will present on their results on the last day of class. A report of the project is due on the day of the presentation.

Peer Scoring: Each group member will evaluate and score the level of participation and contribution of the other members of the group. On the last day of class, you should submit a list of each group member in your group followed by a percentage estimate of their overall contribution to the learning groups (active learning assignments and psychology lab).

Grades will be based on each student's cumulative score on all assignments and will be based on the following scale.
