Description

This course has two main objectives. The primary objective is to offer an introduction to the field of clinical psychology, including theoretical orientations, clinical practices, research, assessment, and critical issues in clinical psychology. The secondary objective is to help students explore their "fit" with a profession in clinical psychology by exploring their own views regarding therapy, research, graduate school and psychology. Many clinicians agree that good psychologists need to be well educated and trained, and should also have the ability to think critically and be aware of their own thoughts, beliefs, values, morals, and limitations. Thus, several of the course requirements are intended to aid students in the exploration of their own beliefs and self-reflection.

Course Requirements

<u>Class Preparation and Discussion Boards</u>: I expect that you will read the material as listed in the course schedule *prior to class*. This is expected so you will better understand the topic and in order for us to have more productive discussions in class. This will also help you better understand and retain the material. If you miss class, please obtain notes from at least one trusted classmate and attend office hours for additional clarification. To encourage reading and discussion, you will participate in online discussion boards (i.e., on Learning Suite) prior to each class period. You will be expected to post one (1) thoughtful question you have after completing the assigned reading, and two (2) thoughtful answers/responses/comments to classmates' questions on each discussion board. The question should NOT be quiz-style (e.g., Who is most commonly associated with psychodynamic psychotherapy?), but should rather be a sincere question that reflects your own thinking related to the reading. There will be thirteen discussion boards (worth 10 points each) throughout the semester, though you are only required to participate in ten of the discussions, making a total of 100 points possible.

Writing Assignments and Extra Credit: Throughout the semester, you will complete ten (10) short writing assignments. Each assignment will be a response to a prompt provided on a list under the Content page of Learning Suite. Writing prompts will be added to the list throughout the semester as we discuss additional topics. You may choose any 10 prompts to answer, and they may be turned in at any point in the semester until the last day of class, at which point all of the assignments will be due at the end of the day. In the page header of each assignment, include your name and the number of the assignment (e.g., Writing Assignment #5; Extra Credit #2). State the prompt on the first line of the page before answering. Each assignment should be 1-2 pages in length (double-spaced, 12 point font, 1 inch margins, no extra space between paragraphs). Each assignment will be worth 10 points, making a total of 100 points possible. After the 10 required assignments are completed, additional assignments may be completed for 2 points of extra credit each (up to 10 points).

Exams: Exams will cover the readings, lectures, class discussion, and other areas as determined by the instructor. Exam format will be discussed in class prior to each test and may include multiple choice, true/false, matching, short answer, and essay responses. All exams will be administered at the Testing Center (https://testing.byu.edu), except the final exam, which will be administered during our final exam time assigned by the university. I encourage you to contact me for help when needed. There will be no test make-ups except under extreme conditions that require prior approval. Cheating of any kind will result in a lowered grade and other University sanctions. My door is open to discuss concerns before and after exams.

Grading Policy

Your grade will be calculated on the number of points you earn from examinations, quizzes, assignments, and extra credit divided by the total number of points possible. *A general rule of thumb for undergraduate college courses is "2-3 hours of study out of class for every hour in class".* A 'C' is an acceptable grade and a 'B' a very good grade, while an 'A' represents an outstanding level of accomplishment even in comparison with peers

who are often excellent students. We will award grades of C-, D, UW, or E only after individual consideration concerning whether the student's performance in the course merits such a grade.


